A big 'thank you' to Sacramento River Valley District volunteers and 2012 Convention Chairman, Ron Byrd, for the whirlwind success of CGCl's 81st annual convention. The tram tour of UC Davis Arboretum was fabulous, and the workshops were full to the brim! CGCl was honored to have NGC President Shirley Nicolai as our special guest, and we enjoyed the opportunity to get to know her better. She witnessed lots of "positive energy" as we tended to business in a shortened format with a focused schedule.

Highlights include the following:

- Proposed bylaws amendments adding a Communications Director to the Executive Committee as well as Golden Gardens going electronic were approved, both to be effective July 1, 2013.
- Establishing a legacy society was adopted.
- Reserve May 11-18, 2013 to join this president and fellow CGCI members

on a fundraising cruise from Los Angeles to Vancouver, B.C. with ports of call in Santa Barbara, San Francisco, Astoria, Seattle and Victoria. 
Janet Eyre - 2011 Lifetime Service Award

Anza-Borrego Desert State Park - CGCI's Newest State Project

On June 7, 2012, the CGCI Board of Directors
approved a new state project for CGCI members to
help restore the Visitor Center Desert Garden at
Anza-Borrego Desert State Park. Years of declining
budgets and deferred maintenance have left the
beautiful three-acre desert garden surrounding the
Visitor Center in need of serious restoration efforts.
The park has many volunteers willing to supply labor
to restore the garden, but funds are needed to buy

plants and supplies.

CGCI members historically supported Anza-Borrego Desert State Park for thirty-seven years between 1969 and 2006. We now have a new opportunity to provide support again by supplying funds (\$15,000 project total) toward the purchase of desert plants for the garden, or for replacement irrigation line and fittings at the Visitor Center. \$1,000 helps purchase a new pump to provide pressure, \$100 buys 100 yards of PVC pipe and fittings while \$50 will buy ten (small) desert plants or three larger plants. Desert visitors for years will enjoy your contributions!

The CGCI Board of Directors also approved \$1,000 from the Honor Book Fund to seed CGCI's newest state project. Click here for the full resolution. News from CGCI Chairmen

Parliamentarian, Greg Pokorski

This officer attended the parliamentary workshop presented by NGC Parliamentarian Joan Corbisiero at the recent NGC convention in Buffalo. Copies of her handout on the 11th edition of *Robert's Rules of Order* were available at the parliamentary exhibit in the exhibit room and placed in the District Director and Officer mail boxes. Natural Resources Chairman, Dwight Holford

To be considered a natural resource, a material or an area must be considered useful or of value to a particular human culture. Natural resources, renewable, are living or biotic; and others, such as soil and water which are closely associated with and affected by living organisms, are non-renewable. Therefore, water must be a non-renewable natural resource. Water can be desalinated or cleaned-up to be fit for an intended use, but we cannot make more water.

The supply and condition of water in California is affected by many factors, most of which are interrelated. Such items include timing and amount of precipitation, the location and the condition of the land it falls on. Storage methods, distribution methods, usage practices and conservation are part of the equation. Climate change, too, is playing a part on the availability and need for water.

Making positive changes in the management of our water resource is made difficult by the very complex nature of the problem. Engineering questions are not clean cut as is further complicated by the large sums of money needed to cure problems. Getting everyone to agree on legislation to take action to solve some of these problems has proven to be a great task. So, stay informed, stay involved and do the best you can.

Scholarship Committee Co-Chairman, Albert Chang

The Scholarship Committee requests that district and clubs provide scholarship information to the Committee so the Committee can list this information on the CGCI website to aid students, parents, counselors, educators and instructors to know what scholarships are available from CGCI clubs and districts.

Please provide the following information:

- 1. Number of scholarships and dollar amounts.
- 2. Qualifications (for example: student must be in horticulture or related subjects, etc.).
- 3. Restrictions (for example: must be from a particular school or area, etc.).
- 4. Name of club and district.

- 5. Contact information (usually the club president and an email or snail mail address).
- 6. Name and contact information of scholarship winner(s).

Flower Show Awards Chairman, Susan Coolidge

So far this year, twelve flower shows have been registered and held, with ten receiving evaluations. At least one show took place which was not registered. Five clubs registering shows this year also held them in 2011. An argument for registering shows is to validate judges' claims in their records leading to accreditation; however, at present, there is no system for communicating registered Standard Flower Shows to the Flower Show Judges' Credentials Chairman. Of course, in addition, many judge flower shows at fairs, which do not register with CGCI and which do not always have panels of three accredited judges; in fact, judges may depend on fairs to receive credit. Flower Show Judges use NGC standards, whatever the setting.

There are many CGCI Flower Show Awards offered; clubs can plan their shows with these in mind.

Clubs are advised to register their shows and have them evaluated; much can be learned by meeting with the judges and hearing their comments. Of course, it is hoped clubs will take the next step and, if eligible, apply for an award and prepare a Book of Evidence. Standard Flower Shows are a wonderful way to show off clubs to the public.

Blue Star Memorials, George Unrine, Co-Chairman

First, marker prices were increased last month. Byway markers are now \$450 and large markers are now \$1400, both including shipping. The website has been updated as will be the upcoming yearbook.

This chairman would like to congratulate EI Cerrito Garden Club for recently installing a byway marker at the Richmond History Museum and dedicating it on May 28th. Bay Bridges District will be dedicating a byway marker in Castro Valley later this summer. Meadow Vista Garden Club will be dedicating a new byway marker on November 11. Nearby Colfax GardenClub must relocate a marker and is coordinating with Meadow Vista Garden Club to hold a rededication on the same day to save out-of=town attendees an extra trip.

CALTRANS is an enthusiastic partner of the Blue Star Project. CALTRANS personnel are currently moving an old highway marker from storage to an area completing construction at the 5th Street end of the Bay Bridge in San Francisco. They also purchased two replacement highway markers for rest areas being renovated on Highway 99 near Tipton. One was badly aged and one had gone missing. This Chairman will check with CALTRANS on the fate of the marker at Mono Lake Overlook. They are often removed during construction, and the posts may not be reusable and left for demolition.

Golden Gardens Changes

At the 81st CGCI Convention in Sacramento, the CGCI Board of Directors voted to

rename the online newsletter, from *eNews* to *Golden Gardens eNews*. The convention body voted to suspend the publication of *Golden Gardens* in print form. This move was necessitated by the precarious financial position in which the magazine had been for a long time coupled with rapidly declining subscribership. It was not a decision made easily nor without extensive time and effort put into research for alternatives and options, but the final outcome was fairly straightforward.

We invite you to enjoy the final four print issues of *Golden Gardens* (Summer 2012, Fall 2012, Winter 2013, and Spring 2013). Additionally, we encourage you to subscribe to *Golden Gardens eNews* which will cover the same articles and information plus a lot more than can be covered in the print edition in a more timely manner than a quarterly print edition can deliver. The monthly online newsletter is free of charge and all prior issues of the online newsletter are available in the archives online. To subscribe, click here.

During this final year, when it comes time for 100% clubs to renew their subscriptions, the club may subscribe their members with email to *Golden Gardens eNews* and pay only for those who need to receive the publication in printed form (still paying the 100% club subscription rate of \$5 per person).

Bay Bridges District

Bay Bridges District received a \$25,000 grant to support its scholarship program at Merritt College. The Bonita Garden Club/Frances Whyte Restricted Scholarship Fund will allow for two, \$1,000 scholarships annually, for at least 12 years.

Costa Verde District

All clubs participated in scholarship programs either by providing scholarships to individuals or donations to the CGCI Scholarship Fund. Many clubs participated in Arbor Day programs by planting trees to enhance their communities, honoring individuals or donating funds to organizations that encourage the protection of our environment. The District sponsored a trip to the 23rd annual South Coast Plaza Flower Show and garnered funds for the district. A highlight of the year was a \$1,000 donation to the South Coast Botanic Foundation renovation of its Rose Garden as a result of a very

successful Landscape Design Study Program from which these funds were derived.

Mendo-Lake District

Potter Valley Garden Club reports its membership continues to grow. The club is planning to award a scholarship to a Potter Valley High School graduate. Last year's recipient is attending Cal Poly, majoring in a new major of Ag Communications. Fort Bragg Garden Club has had a very successful "Tree Planting Program" in downtown Fort Bragg. Again this year, the club joined forces with the Rhododendron Society for the annual Rhododendron Show in May. Also, the club will be awarding a \$500 scholarship to a student with a career toward floriculture, horticulture and related fields.
