From the President's Desk...

April 2018, Vol. 10-4

Congratulations and thank you to 2018 Winter Board Meeting co-chairmen Lisa Cosand and Judy Doane and the volunteers of Channel Islands District. Your team was very successful in providing our board members and guests with educational opportunities, a pleasant atmosphere in which to conduct business, great meals, and wonderful programs as well as lots of laughter, fun and good memories.



The Getting to Know You Lunch with Channel Islands District members joining the CGCI board members was a success. This brilliant idea came from Channel Islands District. This president hopes to offer a similar program again at our next fall and/or winter board meetings.

Another inspired idea was Lisa Cosand's invitation to Nancy Osborne to appear as Audrey Hepburn. What a great time! Everyone looked so stylish in the *Dinner at Tiffany's* attire and the line dancing took the evening to another level.

At the winter board meeting we learned how some of the information shared during "The Fair – Butte County Style" in Oroville has been used. Launa Gould reported that her club has scheduled a Flower Press Workshop. Luther Burbank District Director, Marybeth Hull shared her experience of returning from the 2018 Fall Board Meeting in Oroville only to be evacuated during the Tubbs Fire in the Santa Rose area a few days later. Marybeth had just made seed balls in Oroville and with lots of time on her hands, she got people together for seed ball making parties and Wildfire Wildflowers was created. Others, in very informal settings mentioned that they were also incorporating what they learned into activities for their club or district. The impact of "The Fair - Butte County Style" will expand when a similar event is offered at the 2019 Pacific Region Convention in Van Nuys.

On February 22, this president visited Cascade District for their spring meeting. This district has approximately 200 members in 7 clubs located in Shasta, Tehama and Trinity Counties. Approximately 45-50 members attended representing all seven clubs. Cascade District Director, Kathy Bramhall has to be doing something very special to have such a high percentage of attendance at a district meeting. *Kudos to Kathy!*

Carmen Scott presented a Bonsai program that included a bit of bonsai history, educational information about the care of bonsai, with emphasis on the need for frequent watering. Most importantly included was a demonstration of the process for creating a bonsai starting with two one gallon junipers purchased from a big box store with a plant center. Each plant was taken from the standard black plastic container and then down to the root ball before the base, lowest branches, number of branches, existing structure, "movement" and root system were evaluated. Once the second plant was determined to be the best choice, it was time for the juniper to begin its life as a bonsai. A jin, a deadwood technique of stripping the bark in a certain area was used to begin the process of making the tree look older and like it really had to struggle to survive to old age. Roots were trimmed where necessary. A special planting mixture composed of clay rocks, decomposed granite and lava gravel was placed in the container. The tree was wired to force changes in the shape of this bonsai and then it was all wired to the container to prevent it from tipping over. A bit more of the planting mixture was added before the planting mixture was compressed by poking with a wooden skewer to eliminate any air pockets.

Southern California Garden Club is sponsoring an educational event open to everyone which will also serve as a NGC Tri-Refresher. California Native Plant Week April 15-21, 2018 By Roxanne Campbell, Chairman

In 2010 the California State Legislature approved Assembly Concurrent Resolution (ACR) No. 173, Evans-Native Plant Week. This declared the 3rd week of April as California Native Plant Week and encourages community groups, schools, and citizens to undertake appropriate activities to promote the conservation, restoration, and appreciation of California's native plants.

ACR 173 recognizes the vital historical, artistic and economic contributions California's native plants have made to our state and points out that California native plant gardening and landscaping have tremendous positive impacts to our watersheds, to habitat recovery and to curbing catastrophic wildfires. It also recognizes that home landscaping and gardening with native plants can cut residential water use from 60 to 90% over conventional gardening. Daffodils Across the Ridge By Jayne Locas (Presented at 2018 Winter Board by

(Presented at 2018 Winter Board by Ward Habriel)

As a resident of the town of Paradise, I always felt that something was needed to bring the community together, a unifying concept that would bring hope and joy to all who passed this way. But what could be done that would enhance the beauty that the town already possessed? I was stumped! The solution eluded me.

In 2002, I heard of the Daffodil Project in New York City. A city wide project to plant daffodils to serve as a memorial for the tragedy of 9-11. I began to envision a daffodil project as a way to bring beauty to the entire town. Shortly thereafter, a friend gave me a sign: "To Plant A Garden, is to Believe in Tomorrow." The sign was accompanied by some flowers to start a garden at my home. This became a mantra that carried me through a serious illness. As I was recovering I noted the many daffodils planted at a business on the corner of Skyway and Elliot in Paradise. My vision began to take shape, but just a vague shape.

In 2008, I approached the Paradise Garden Club president with a proposal to plant 3,000 daffodils in the town of Paradise as the beginning of an ongoing project that would bring warmth to the soul after a long and often dreary winter. The club adopted the project, but while the vision was in it's infancy, the town was devastated by the Humboldt Fire. Many of the club members were evacuated, and saw their friends and families lose their homes and all that was near and dear to them. "To Plant a Garden is to Believe in Tomorrow" became the motto for the project. The vision was no longer just to bring warmth to the soul after the dreary winter, it was also to bring hope for the future.

Before we were able to take any action on our revised vision, we were blanketed in smoke and ashes and saw days with no sun. The Camp Fire had burst through its boundaries and was licking at the east side of town. Once again many club members were evacuated, never knowing if they would see their beloved homes and gardens again.

Thus, the scope of the project finally took shape..."To plant daffodils across the Ridge to warm the soul after a long and dreary winter....combined with the desire to bring life back to a community suffering from a summer of fire, smoke and ashes."

To date, the vision for 3,000 bulbs to be planted the first year has grown to 60,000 bulbs. The club beautification committee allotted \$2,000 to provide the first 10,000 bulbs. The additional funding was provided through community support.

While the vision for "Daffodils Across the Ridge" started with one person, without the diligent efforts and undying support of the daffodil committee, the faith of the garden club members, and enthusiastic response of the entire community, that vision would not have had the strength to take flight.

News from Project Mission Blue, Phase II Shane Looper, Chairman

The following is excerpted from the 2011-2018 Summary Report by Price Sheppy, Golden Gate National Parks Conservancy:

"In 2016 we began Phase II of Project: Mission Blue. While continuing to grow and plant lupines, we have also started to grow nectar plants for the adult Mission Blue butterfly. In 2017 we planted 703 nectar plants that included coast buckwheat (*Eriogonum latifolium*), California phacelia (*Phacelia californica*), checkerbloom (*Sidalcea malviflora*), and yarrow (*Achillea millefolium*). These nectar plants are much easier to grow, and we have had high planting survivorship rates.

The increase in lupines at our park site called Milagra Ridge has given us the opportunity to apply and receive a permit from the Department of Fish and Wildlife to move Mission blue butterflies from an existing healthy butterfly population at San Bruno Mountain County Park to the newly created lupine patches at Milagra Ridge. For the past two years we have introduced Mission blue butterflies to new and existing lupine patches and are successfully monitoring the establishment of these new populations of butterflies.

The National Park and the Golden Gate National Parks Conservancy want to thank the California Garden Clubs, Inc. for their sustained support of Project: Mission Blue. It is through a prolonged effort that we are able to make such a great impact on the survival of the endangered Mission blue butterfly and engage the surrounding communities in environmental education and stewardship. "

Price also sent the picture below of the Lupine **WE** planted in the Park. Can you **Find the caterpillar** in the picture? That green caterpillar will soon be a Mission Blue Butterfly. All of your donations are working to increase the Mission Blue population with food for this endangered species. EXCITING NEWS!!
