Almost three quarters of the first year of this biennium has gone by. We have accomplished quite a bit. We kept the Diablo Foothills District viable. Co-Director, Dolores Moffat, has attended the CGCI Board Meetings and brought current issues for us to forward to the clubs in our district. Members from the different clubs in our district are encouraged to keep the lines of communication open so we can all benefit from the different and innovative programs they select for their clubs. DFD programs have been interesting and educational. We learned about local injured, wild birds, snakes and other animals that are being cared for in a local sanctuary where they can be intro-

duced back into nature when they are well. Some find permanent homes there if they would not survive if released back into the wild. Some of the residents of the sanctuary visited us so we could see the progress they had made.

We learned about wild mushrooms in our area and how to identify them. There are so many different varieties. Some that are safe to eat are very close in appearance to poisonous look a likes. It is even very hard for seasoned mushroom growers to choose correctly between those that grow wild. We were given a selection of resource materials to help us identify mushrooms in the wild or grow our own. It is important to keep our properties free of these mushrooms as dogs and even a few cats like to eat these specimens. Unfortunately these animals can be very susceptible to the poisons.

If clubs share information on their programs, other clubs may bring some of the same programs to their clubs. If you promote these programs to the public, you may encourage others to attend your meetings and possibly even get new members to join you. *Cont. next page*

David Rust, Mycological Association, speaker at our February 22nd meeting. Talk Takeaways.

Mushrooms. Fungi. Can be ugly, can be amazingly beautiful....but oh so extremely beneficial in many ways.

Beneficial in the lawn and garden: Mushrooms are the "flower" of fungi. The real action takes place underground. Some fungi act in a symbiotic relationship with plants, by scouring soil and organic matter for nutrients, and act with the roots of our plants to enhance their absorption of nutrients and water. Fungi also act as decomposers, breaking down complex molecules that can be used by plants, such as nitrogen and phosphorus – as well as other minerals vital to plant health. Different "mushrooms" act with herbaceous plants in a symbiotic relationship to protect the plant from pathogens. One example is the "dead man's foot" mushroom which helps the root system thrive.

Most biomass in soil is actually composed of fungi, rather the mycelium (hair like connectors on the fungus) acts as an "internet" and highways for communities of plants...We are at the beginnings of understanding that communities of trees and plants "talk" to each other and respond to each other by using the mycelium to share resources and ward off pathogens. Wood Wide Web, with NOVA has an excellent short program about this discovery. Walking on a forest floor will take on new meaning after you view this program.

Mushrooms, we are learning may have benefits to human health. "They're low in carbohydrates and calories, but a great source of B vitamins, trace minerals, fiber and even protein. They also an **anti-inflammatory food**, containing high levels of beta-glucans compounds that keep immune cells alert, plus a powerful antiox-idant called ergothioneine that helps lower bodywide inflammation" (<u>https://draxe.com/mushroom-nutrition-benefits</u>)

Co-Director, Gloria Utley, called the meeting to order at 10:03 A.M.

Pledge of Allegiance

Corresponding Secretary, Linda Flood, took Roll Call. All DFD Officers present except, Assistant Director, Steve Lane. Representatives from all clubs present except Northern Camellia Society and Ruth Bancroft Gardens.

Secretary, Linda Cruz, provided copies of minutes from August 24th Board meeting. Parliamentarian, Judy Bates, suggested the heading "Diablo Foothills District Executive Board Meeting Minutes" be changed to "Diablo Foothills District Executive Committee Meeting Minutes." August minutes were approved for file as changed.

Pro tem Secretary, Linda Holmes, provided minutes from September 21st, 2017 via an e-blast. After brief discussion, minutes were approved.

Treasurer, Audrey Marlovits, provided a Treasurer's Report from July 1, 2017-Feb 1, 2018, attached. The report will be filed for audit.

There were 3 ads placed in the Diablo Foothills District Directory. All are paid in full.

Penny Pines Chair, Aprill McBeth, passed around the Penny Pines collection box.

Awards Chair, Mona Dunlop, handed out application forms for Propagator of the Year and Floral Arranger which includes NEW this year "Container Designer of the Year." The application deadline is June 1st. Individual winners receive \$25 and a Certificate. Reminders will be sent out to district clubs. DFD is looking for a Chair to coordinate volunteers for General Meeting refreshments. There were no volunteers. It was discussed that refreshments will be rotated alphabetically amongst the clubs. Clayton Valley Garden Club provided today's refreshments; Discovery Bay will be responsible for providing refreshments for the June 28th meeting. There was a motion, seconded, and passed.

Clubs were reminded that the Diablo Foothills District needs 3 directories from each club; 1 for each of the co-Directors, and 1 for the Communications Director.

The California Garden Clubs, Inc. (CGCI) convention will be held June 4-7 at the Black Oak Casino & Hotel in Tuolumne. It was asked how many clubs budget for attendance at the convention. Walnut Creek & Clayton Valley responded that they partially budget for convention attendance. All members are invited to attend; however, clubs are entitled to 1 delegate per 50 members.

Nominating Committee volunteers were requested. A slate of nominees needs to be introduced in February 2019 for the election for the next board for July 1, 2019. Volunteers were: Marlene Kinney of Clayton Valley Garden Club, Mona Dunlop of Walnut Creek Garden Club, and Aprill McBeth of Discovery Bay Garden Club. A motion was made, seconded, and passed to accept this Nominating Committee. The Committee will select a Chair, and then meet with Parliamentarian, Judy Bates, for guidance.

CGCI Winter Board meeting report by co-Director, Dolores Moffat: There were presentations on Zoology, Birds, Grafting, Pruning, Daylilies, and Officer Reports. Reminder all members should subscribe to Golden Garden E-news. Submit articles by the 15th of each month. There are 266 clubs in CGCI which are entitled to discounts and garden entrance with the CGCI Membership card. There were 13 District Director reports.

Beware-Scams: There have been scams using the CGCI President name. The scams have been successful in obtaining money from Treasurers.

District Director from Redding gave a presentation about collecting luggage stamps to donate to charity. The Paradise Garden Club co-President provided a presentation on wildfire safety and what plants not to plant near your house. Google Diablo Fire Safety Council and select Landscape Planting guide for information.

CGCI Awards: There are over 70 CGCI Awards. The Award year is from January 1 through December 31. Each club should have an Awards Chairperson. Review the awards on pages 63-80 in CGCI Yearbook, Manual, and Roster. Life Memberships are available for memorial and past Presidents. There are 3 Scholarships from \$1,000 - \$2000.

Pacific Region Convention: The Pacific Region will hold its convention in Chena Hot Springs, Alaska from April 5-9. WACONIAH is the name of the Pacific Region newsletter and stands for the first letter of each state in the Pacific Region. Robin Pokorski will be the Pacific Region Director for the next two year term. California will host a regional meeting in Van Nuys April 7-10, 2019.

The National Garden Club (NGC) Convention will be held May 21-24. Delegates were appointed. The 9 Officers of the Executive Committee of CGCI meet the day before the meeting starts to recommend budget, position appointments, and to ratify. Meeting was adjourned at 11:00.


