HORTICULTURE REPORT: GEORGINA PACE AQUILEGIA (COLUMBINE)

Scientists suggest the arrival of the genus Aquilegia into North America occurred during the Pleistocene. The Pleistocene Epoch is often referred to as the Great Ice Age. During that glacial period, 10,000 to 40,000 years ago, the Bering land bridge exposed huge areas of the shallow continental shelf. This provided a broad land connection between Asia and unglaciated parts of



and unglaciated parts of (what now are) Alaska and the Yukon. This land bridge allowed many plants and animals to spread between the Asian and American continents. and American continents.
Scientific evidence has
determined that the
genus Aquilegia
originated in Eastern
Europe and Central Asia;

Europe and Central Asia; and, one species of columbine (Aquilegia viridiflora) expanded its range across the Bering land bridge. This Old World species may have evolved into the present day columbine we call Aquilegia brevistyla (small flower columbine). As the genus Aquilegia moved down through the continent into the Rocky Mountains, it evolved with different colors and shapes in response to the environment - including response to the environment - including elevation, weather and pollinators.

Today, bees pollinate the deep blue flowered columbines Aquilegia brevistyla, A. saximontana, A. jonesii, and A. scopulorum like their similarly colored Eurasian counterparts. The North American deep blue flowered columbines all occur in alpine and subalpine habitats or in northern latitudes where other columbine pollinators such as hawk moths and hummingbirds do not commonly occur.
